Restaino Hoping to Make Mayoral Dream Come True

"I've been thinking about it for a long time," former City Court Judge Robert Restaino told this reporter in January of 2017 when asked if he was contemplating a run for mayor of Niagara Falls sometime in the future.

In that interview, Restaino said "I have been going to places where people are-- coffee



shops, senior centers, and neighborhoods, and in my opinion more people than not have breathed a sigh of relief that I might run."

The moment he has been thinking about for a long time has arrived. This week, on Wednesday at 5:30 p.m. at the Como



Restaurant on Pine Ave., Robert Restaino will officially announce his candidacy for mayor of Niagara Falls in 2019. It may be a year away, but Restaino is ready to begin his bid to give the city a new vision for the future.

"I think he would provide very strong leadership," says Jerry Alaimo, a small business owner in Niagara Falls who is hoping for better days ahead for the city he calls home.

Restaino, a youthful 59 years old, indeed has provided strong leadership as president of the Niagara Falls School Board which has increased its fund balance by \$9.7 million over the last three years leading to a bond upgrade this year by the Standard & Poor's credit rating agency.

In a July interview, a restrained Restaino told this newspaper "we need to offer our citizens hope for the future, a new vision," adding that he didn't think the current administration has done enough to grow the non-tourism side of the city.

In that same interview, he hinted at his political platform, saying "we have large industrial areas of the


city that are vacant and we need to do a better job of marketing those opportunities. We need to put ourselves squarely in the job market, especially in the industries of the day; we need to put ourselves in the hunt."

With the city facing serious financial challenges with depleted reserves and the loss of casino revenue due to the standoff between the state and the Seneca Nation, Restaino says it will take a combination of things to get through the crisis, like promoting shared government services, as the school district has done, to reduce costs.

"We need to be innovative and creative," says Restaino. "Find ways to get it done."

The one blemish on Restaino's resume occurred in 2005 when he temporarily jailed 46 spectators in Domestic Violence Court when none of them would admit to a ringing cellphone that was making conducting court business impossible. Despite a 12-year record as a distinguished jurist, he was punished by removal from the bench for the phone incident.

"I've admitted I made a mistake," he told this newspaper two



years ago, saying he told the Judicial Conduct Commission that he had been under stress in his personal life at the time of the incident.

Restaino says, "I owned up to it and I think most people realize it doesn't define me."

Given his record as the leading vote-getter in two school district elections since then and his strong showing in Niagara Falls in a State Assembly race in 2012, it appears voters have concurred that what happened in the courtroom in 2005 does not define Robert Restaino.

Restaino, a Democrat, now joins Seth Piccirillo, a top aide to current Mayor Paul Dyster, as the only announced candidates for mayor. Like Restaino, Piccirillo is a Democrat setting up a possible primary next

September which could turn into a three-way race if Dyster bids for a fourth term. No Republicans have signaled interest in running at this time.

For his part, Piccirillo recently told the Niagara Gazette he will run as his own man, signaling his intent to try to distance himself from Dyster as the city's financial problems escalate. As community development director for the last six years as the city crumbled, Piccirillo won't have an easy time escaping Dyster's shadow.

Voters can expect Restaino to lay out some of his plans for the upcoming campaign at Wednesday's event at the Como Restaurant where refreshments will be served.




of this area in favor of creating and preserving fish habitat.

The plan is that with the barriers it will preserve what remains of this grassy area which is an excellent fish habitat. State Parks also plans to plant more grass in the shallow water.


Much of the grassy area has been lost over the last 100 years.

This may be the last summer for Grass Island boating.

The New York State Parks will commence a project in the fall of next year that will effectively wall off boaters from accessing Grass Island.


Grass Island is not really an island in the usual sense of the word. It is actually an area of shallow water with sea grasses growing above the water. It is just off the shoreline of Buckhorn State Park.

In the summer literally hundreds of boaters love to congregate there and it may be the only area in the upper Niagara River where boaters can anchor in shallow, clean water with a nice sandy bottom and enjoy themselves.

The area is especially popular with boaters from Niagara Falls. On weekends in summer it attracts several hundred boats.

New York State Parks has plans to "renovate" it. They will install rock barriers in about 4 or 5 feet of water, and all the shallow areas within the barriers - out in front of Grass Island - will likely be taken out of the public domain.

It appears this project is focused on keeping boaters out



NY State Parks will erect barrier rocks around Grass Island in an attempt to protect it from natural and human loss of the fish habitat. Because of the grasses, fish can hide from predators and breed.



The yellow line appears to be the area that will have barriers with the apparent result that Grass Island will be restored to its original shape and size. How much this will affect boaters will be seen in the summer of 2020.

What is this preoccupation that Niagara Falls citizens have with death; and is this preoccupation the reason that the city is also dying?

If someone were to come down Porter Road, instead of down Pine Avenue, and then turned onto the Robbins Drive that winds its way through what is believed to be the 2nd

largest city park in the state, they could easily think that they had arrived at the road to St. Joseph's Cemetery. That is because of the amount of decorated memorial trees that line that meandering and once placid stretch of road. It all begs the higher-level question of, "Is Niagara Falls dying less by the decades-long mistakes made in both the voting booths and city hall, or just as much by our city's morbid preoccupation that so many of our citizens have with celebrating death?"

Don't get me wrong,



please. Upon coming to town to start a business, Louisianan Geoff Jenkins pointed out to me that he had never seen a group of people who are more dedicated to helping each other as are the common Niagaran citizen. He attributed that, he said, to the number of basket auctions that we have in and around the city, helping those who have fallen on hard times. The man should know, as he has lived on the Gulf, the West and the East Coast. And that is a good thing.

But, on the other hand, such basket auctions are usually given around the theme of an impending tragedy -- often to prevent a death; and the love and attention is well given and received. But nonetheless, there still remains the morbid element of death.

And don't get me going on the candlelit and Bible-thumping citizens who hovel around telephone poles and street corners where often a nary-dowell meets the consequences of their own bad decisions. Fortunately, these events are rare -- made rarer still by the great job that trauma hospi-

tals like Erie County Medical Center do to actually preserve such lives. And I think that the number of citizens that attend such ceremonies adds support to my contention of our fascination with death more so than life; especially when compared to the few or any of those citizens ever choosing to stand outside of a local abortion clinic or hospital where between 500 -- 600 of Niagara County's babies are intentionally killed in their mother's wombs.

Everything in its time and place, I suppose; but a couple of years ago, a young man was reportedly on his cell phone one night while speeding up Pine Avenue. He drove into a sign and flagpole onto the property at Hyde Park that city council set aside for the development of the American Veterans Monuments. Sadly, the young man died. I could understand his family and friends grieving as on the next night I drove by their candlelight vigil beneath a nearby tree that they had adorned with trinkets of love. As a commissioner of that section of the park, I felt both bad and compelled to

necessary for me to point out that Hyde Park is a public park and not anyone's personal depository for the ashes of their loved ones. That's what cemeteries are for, and the reason that they are called memorial gardens. Why must city workers, already working within their strained budgets, have to work much more carefully in mowing around people's personal monuments rather than being able to just doing their job.

It is my belief that 'the best governments' are ones that do nothing for the individual citizen that it can't do for every such citizen, and that was the very purpose that the

have the adornments removed. But now seeing what has become of Robbins Drive, I feel worse still for having done so – as I feel badly in it being

veterans monument sought to ensure – every veteran equally remembered and remembered together. That's also what family plots and mausoleums are for, and not what the scores of very distracting roadside memorials actually do. And what happens when one of those Robbins Drive trees has to be cut down?

While Councilwoman Kristin Grandinetti and I often disagreed on many policy issues, she and I agreed that the best memorials to traffic accidents and others who tragically died along city streets shouldn't be burning candles left unattended, rain-soaked teddy bears, deflating balloons and empty alcoholic beverage bottles on the city public right of ways as though they are a person's personal properties. We came up with a plan to allow people to purchase standard signs with the person's name on it, much like the Adopt-a-Highway ones, where with their commitment to keep the block clean and cared for upon which the event occurred, people can commemorate the lives – not the deaths – of their loved ones with the small and stock sign. In other words, the person performs a public good; not just a personal one. I have to finish that project as well.

Again, of the nearly two-dozen such trees along Robbins Drive, argument can be made that each person honored was indeed an honorable person; but I know of only one who provided a public service, and that one is the type of person who should be honored on public property.

But the even bigger picture



is still that as long as we Niagarans celebrate death to the degree that we do, the what was, more than we celebrate life and the what could be – like the birth of a child, we will always be a shrinking and dying, self-serving city. Perhaps city council can take the first step in changing that by passing an ordinance making it against the law to dispose of cremation remains on any public property within its jurisdiction, and an ordinance that forbids the practice without written permission of the property owner. That should help to keep its right of ways looking inviting for our millions of visitors and caring residents.

North Tonawanda Fire Department to Finally get New Pumper

Members of the North Tonawanda Common Council gave a big boost to the North Tonawanda Fire Department after approving \$50,000 to get a new pumper.

Members of the NTFD will tell you that it has been a year-long project to get this new truck. The project was started with a grant from Senator Ortt's office of \$220,000. Since then the minimum bid for the truck has increased.

"The lowest bid that we received was \$476,992 and the highest bid was \$541,759. The amount of money funded was \$420,000 including \$220,000

that came from a grant, so I am requesting an additional \$50,000 so that we can meet the minimum bid," said Joseph Sikora, Fire Chief.

Sikora says the new truck will help better serve the City.

"It will serve the City the way we need it to be served and will last 30 years with our department," said Sikora.

Members of the Common Council approved the additional funding by a vote of 5 to 0.

Common Council President Eric Zadzilka says that these types of resources for public safety are of the utmost important to the council.

"I can't begin to describe the respect that each member



of this Council has for all of the men and women serving this community," said Zadzilka.

"Making sure that our firefighters have the best vehicles and equipment necessary is one of the largest responsibili-

ties we have as public servants. Keeping the public safe is something that these individuals do each and every day. The least we can do is make sure they have operational equipment to do so.

Prior to riding the carrousel, the kids had lunch with Santa and got to tell him what they want for Christmas.


“Santa is here riding the Carrousel with all the families that come in and Santa goes and sees all the kids here, we

Dealing with Those Cold Weather Aches and Pains


Are your aches and pains worse when it's cold outside? Chilly temperatures can be especially punishing for workers who have arthritis or other painful conditions. A study involving nearly 135,000 construction workers found that working in cold environments increased their risk for developing back and neck pain. The Laborers' advise and train our members to prepare themselves to work safely and productively in any environment. Understanding the factors that can lead to injury and chronic conditions are an important preventative measure that not only helps our members but also results in less time out and turnover for our contractors.

Relying on medication may seem like an answer to address pain that worsens when temperatures drop, but that can present its own problems and there are other measures you should try first. Cold weather can affect us both externally and internally. You can't stop the cold weather, but you can control some of its effects and prepare for it. Keeping warm, stretching and following other best practices can help reduce the aches and pains that cold weather brings.

- Dress in layers and wear a hat. Choose the warmest gloves you can find that still allow you to handle tools safely.
- Get out of the cold at the first signs of hypothermia.
- Keep blood flowing to your hands and feet by doing simple exercises like making a fist for a few seconds or doing heel-toe raises.
- At night, use extra blankets or an electric blanket on your bed to help keep your muscles from tightening.
- Keep your home as warm as you can. Run your car for a few minutes to preheat it before you drive.
- Take a few minutes to stretch before you go to work.
- Stay hydrated. Drinking water throughout the day helps lubricate the joints.
- Use a humidifier at home. Heat from the furnace removes moisture from the air, which can affect your joints.

Employers should educate workers about the signs and symptoms of hypothermia and other cold stress situations. They should encourage employees to watch out for each other and make sure they are comfortable about reporting cold stress-related issues. Encourage employees to warm up before starting their shift. This can be done by making stretching exercises part of the daily safety briefing. Encourage employees to speak up if they are experiencing pain on the job or feel they can't perform a task without aggravating a previous injury or other condition.


