practice that embodies the highest ideals of the NYSBA's Criminal Justice Section.



“The tree lighting is something that people all around here look



Jason Zona Will Not Seek Re-Election in the Fifth Legislative District

Four term county lawmaker to remain as Niagara County Democratic Party Chairman

Niagara County Legislator Jason Zona (D)- Niagara Falls has announced he will not seek re-election to the county legislature in 2019. The four term incumbent, and recently elected Niagara County Democratic Chairman has represented Town of Niagara and parts of Niagara Falls at county hall since 2012.

"I've been honored for eight years to represent the residents of the fifth district in county government" Zona stated. "It's been a great experience. We were able to take on challenging issues while at the same time meeting great people throughout the district. On top of that, I had the privilege of getting to know many of the fantastic employees that serve county government."

Zona, who has been part of the Minority Caucus in the Legislature that included the three other demo-

cratic lawmakers from Niagara Falls was elected unanimously September 17th as the new leader of the County Democratic Party. He frequently sparred with republican majority leaders who have controlled county government for almost two decades.

Zona added "I've always felt the one party dominance in the county has lead to many instances of bad government which has hurt the residents of this county. It's the reason I decided to take on the county chairmanship. Until we balance out this legislature, and eliminate the super majority in county government, were just asking for many of the problems we have."

Niagara County Republican committee members recently elected county lawmaker Rich Andres as their new party boss. Andres has stated he will remain in his seat with the legislature. Zona feels trying to do both positions is too much to take on and he considers it a conflict.



"I just feel the time constraints to do both jobs successfully are too much. I also feel it makes governing much more difficult when your being charged with finding better alternatives to your legislative colleagues" Zona commented. "I can say this, as far as the fifth district goes, we will have a fantastic replacement nominated regardless to replace me so I feel comfortable in that regard."

County Legislator, and longtime Minority Leader Dennis Virtuoso (D)- Niagara Falls stated " Jason has done a fantastic job representing his district. I'm disappointed he's leaving the legislature but we're very confident he's going to be successful running the party and that's very important. We know he'll have a strong replacement for his seat as well."



"It is indeed a high honor, and it puts me in the company of some of this area's very best attorneys of the past and present who have received this very prestigious award," said LaTona. "I am humbled to be named this year's recipient and will travel to New York's Hilton Hotel on Jan. 16 with my children and grandchildren to receive the award."

Word of LaTona's selection comes shortly after U. S. Judge William Skretny sided with LaTona last month, sparing his client more jail time, in a landmark tax case that LaTona took all the way to the U. S. Supreme Court and won in a 7 - 2 decision last March with one justice saying it put too much power in the hands of prosecutors who could not be relied on for the use of discretion. It is a case that attorneys for newspaper publisher Frank Parlato and co-defendant Chitra Selvaraj hope to use in their defense

against pending federal tax charges in a motion based on the decision and scheduled for argument Dec. 19 before federal Magistrate Judge Jeremiah McCarthy.

Local federal prosecutors had attempted to put LaTona's ailing 72-year-old client, Carlo Marinello, back in prison on his federal tax conviction despite the Supreme Court decision, and LaTona was successful in arguing before Judge Skretny that the government's efforts amounted to an abuse of power. Skretny sentenced Marinello to time served, the 21 months he already spent in prison on his felony conviction in 2014 of tax evasion and obstructing the IRS.

LaTona was successful in winning Supreme Court review of Marinello's conviction even after three appeals court upheld the conviction and only one court agreed with the defense attorney's argu-

ments.

LaTona said the issue was whether the government should have had a proceeding in place against Marinello before bringing charges, and while three appeals courts said it was not necessary, the fourth court and the Supreme Court agreed with LaTona.

"Thank God we have an independent judiciary," said LaTona, "and the Supreme Court's decision is a victory for Carlo and all taxpayers in the country."

LaTona added that recent Supreme Court decisions have helped dampen efforts by the Department of Justice to pursue cases beyond the intent of Congress.

Attorney Joel Daniels, who represents Parlato's codefendant, Chitra Selvaraj, said he and Parlato's attorney, Paul Cambria, have filed a motion to drop conspiracy charges in the case based on the

Supreme Court's decision in Marinello. Arguments are scheduled for Dec. 19th.

"Marinello is a high roadblock for the government trying to try and make an end run [in this case]," said Daniels.

Federal prosecutors in Buffalo earlier this year dropped charges that Parlato stole \$1 million from the Seagram's heirs linked to the NXIVM cult after Parlato was credited with helping prosecutors in New York indict the leader of the cult, Keith Raniere, for allegedly forcing women to engage in sexual activity with him as a condition of membership in the secret society.

It was Parlato's vigorous reporting through news outlets across the country that was widely credited with pushing the government to investigate and ultimately charge Raniere and Seagram's heiress Clare Bronfman in the NXIVM case.

The Niagara Reporter publisher, Frank Parlato, turned the tables on the vicious NXIVM cult.

There are those who say that what Parlato did, will make journalistic and American legal history. At least two major television documentaries that will feature Parlato's role in destroying one of the most deadly cults in America will be coming

out on major networks. Details on this will be reported in the coming weeks.

In addition, TV actress Catherine Oxenberg wrote a compelling book "Captive", that gives details about Parlato's brave role in taking down the dangerous sex cult and freeing her daughter and more than 100 slaves that were trapped in the wicked cult.



John Long Connected George Bush to Niagara County

Character is often defined as being the same person in public that you are in private; and, by all measures, former President George Herbert Walker Bush -- 41st President of the United States, had character. And after reading the many reports about Bush's character, and not getting to personally know the president, I felt that I knew him through not only his public appearances -- after all, it was the debate that he did in the presidential debates against Massachusetts Governor Michael Dukakis that convinced me to change parties from a Jesse Jackson Democrat to a Bush Republican. But I think that

I also got to later know President Bush through my association with Niagara County GOP Chairman John Long, a Niagara Falls insurance man who had offices on Main Street next to the 'Round the Clock Restaurant.

Several years ago, the staffers at the White House were interviewed to answer the question of which of the presidents whom they had served behaved in public as they behaved in their private quarters at the White House. George and Barbara Bush won hands down. Bear in mind that these were the lowly, non-politically appointed workers who cooked, cleaned, mowed the grass and the likes, and not the pretenders who grinned for the cameras and then scowled the rest of the time. The interview spoke volumes about the even-handedness, even-temperedness of the Navy war hero and his wife.

With Bush, from what I understand, would put political party aside and work with the Democrats, even in the day light hours; unlike his predecessor President Reagan and Speaker



of the House Thomas P. O'Neill, who would fight each other as pundits in the daylight hours and share a bottle as friends in the evening. And that puts me in mind with former Democrat John Long.

Long was an avid hunter of all types of game, as well as an environmentalist, as most hunters are. John also made his own turkey calls. John once told me that he was no friend of President GHW Bush's Secret Service because, according to him, when he found himself early one morning driving in the area of Camp David and knew that Bush was there, he dropped in and presented the president with new a turkey caller.

It sounded like a nice gesture to me if he could do that, so I asked John why the Secret Service would care. He said that it was in the pre-dawn hours and they would have to wake up the president and they would have to get up and dressed, and then immediately go traipsing into the wooded fields with the president and call turkeys. Long had nothing but good things to say about Bush; and when John died, Bush was no longer the president. I called Bush at his office in Houston. He wasn't in, but I left a message to tell him that his friend had died.

A profound sadness fell across me when John died. I feel the ripples of that pain with the passing of Bush. My changing of parties to Bush's party wasn't about Bush's powerful personality because he wasn't impressive to me that way; and it wasn't so much about his party's policies either -- it was about the values that the man espoused, values that I came to realize that I had and have long held, but had been

obscured by the dark clouds of popular politics. I found those same values in John Long.

I knew that Long had once been a Democrat and had changed parties to become a Republican chairman. A year following my run for state senate against Anthony Nanula, I sat down at lunch with Long at the 'Round the Clock restaurant and asked him not to endorse Democrat Legislator Renae Kimble to run for state senate against Nanula on our line. Like a lot of Democrats, Kimble was notorious in her rhetoric against "those people." Long listened to my plea, sipped his soup, and when I had said all that I had to say, he looked at me and said, "Kenny. I like Renae. She's always done everything I have asked her to do."

While it showed Long's willingness to work across the lines, like Bush's, I just sat there and smiled at him. He continued to look into my eyes. I had known Kimble and how she was since we were kids, and he knew it. After a few moments, Long smiled and said, "She was going to do those things anyway, wasn't she?"

Bush, Long and even Kimble worked within their natures. Some like Bush and Long, some like Reagan and O'Neill, and some even like Kimble. But Kimble helped me to see Long and John Long's character. While I was not pleased with Long's decision to allow her to run, I was pleased with his political flexibility. While Bush pulled me into the GOP, Long's Bush-like character helped keep me there. And if I was Long, or even Bush, I would have done it much the same -- we must put more stock in people than we put into parties.

North Tonawanda to Receive \$73,000 for Community Improvements

Inside North Tonawanda City Hall 8th District Legislator Rich Andres alongside Mike Zimmerman, the Cities Director of Community Development, announced a \$73,000 initiative to benefit residents. The money, which will be

coming from community development block grant funding, is going to be used for two specific purposes.

“Some of the things that we came up with while working alongside the Common Council is that we have put together a list of priority projects that we want to get done,” said Andres. “The first would be sidewalk improvements. I don’t know if you have ever walked down by Crazy Jakes, but the sidewalks are crumbling and

some of them need to be dealt with.”

Zimmerman says over the summer they put together a map of what some of the worst sidewalks that need to be dealt with.

But it’s not sidewalks that Alderman-At-Large Bob Pecoraro wants. He wants Wi-Fi.

“I was thinking what is really needed in the downtown area is Wi-Fi,” said Pecoraro. “That to me is a priority that we get connected. Especially when people are coming off their boats in the summer time and going shopping.”

Andres says that is a priority as well as improving part of Oliver Street.

“What we don’t have is trees and that has been sort of a pet project of mine for years,” said Andres.

The area they are looking at putting in some trees is around Wheatfield and Sommer Street.

“There are no street trees,” said Zimmerman. “It’s pretty barren and very unattractive.”

Andres says he hopes adding greenspace to parts of Oliver Street will not only help to make to the area look better but help improve economic



development.

“It’s been a long-standing interest of mine to improve Oliver Street. It has old buildings and a certain amount of charm but what it is missing is that green factor. It is missing

that nice sort of homey feel and I think that is because it is so barren,” said Andres.

Members of the Common Council say they expect to start the projects sometime in the spring.

forward to,” said Mayor Art Pappas. “It draws a lot of people and is another way of bringing the community together. You see people from the school district, parents and little ones. It is a great event to help ring the holidays.”

Haz Com and a Worker's Right to Know

Chemicals pose a wide range of physical hazards and health hazards to LIUNA members, from skin irritation and sensitization to exposure to known carcinogens. OSHA's Hazard Communication standard, also known as the "Right to Know Law," is designed to ensure that vital information about chemical hazards and protective measures is passed along to workers who may come in contact with or handle these types of chemicals. OSHA's HazCom standard requires companies to evaluate the chemicals they produce or import, then provide information about any hazards. This information is relayed using a universal labeling system – the Globally Harmonized System of Classification and Labeling of Chemicals (GHS) – with more detailed information being provided on safety data sheets (SDSs).

OSHA's HazCom standard requires employers to take the following actions if hazardous chemicals exist in the workplace:

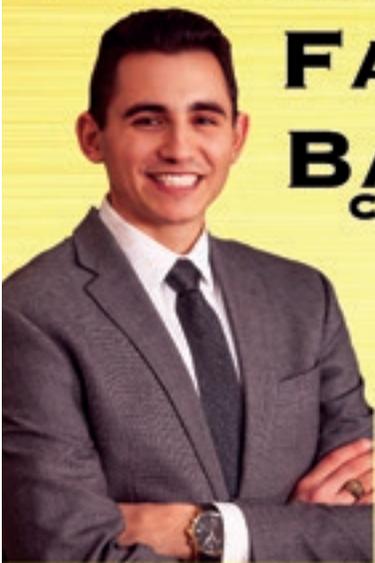
- Implement a written hazard communication program
- Ensure all chemical containers are labeled
- Provide SDSs to employees
- Train all workers who could potentially be exposed on the hazards and available protective measures

OSHA requires this information to be presented in a manner and language that employees can understand. All of this information must be shared with employees when work is assigned and again when a new chemical hazard is introduced that workers have not previously been trained on. Providing this information alongside safety data sheets allows workers to effectively participate in an employer's protection program and take steps to protect themselves.

OSHA's HazCom standard is called the "Right to Know" law because it gives workers information about the health risks of chemicals that they wouldn't normally have access to. However, as OSHA notes on its Hazard Communication page, the standard could also be called the "Right to Understand" law because of all the worker training requirements it includes. The standard requires employers to train workers on the following information related to the labeling of hazardous chemicals:

Product identifier; pictograms; signal word; hazard statement; precautionary statement; and a supplier identification. Training employees to interpret labels on harmful chemicals helps ensure proper handling and storage and that employees are able to quickly locate important information in a first-aid situation.
